NURSERY and FPNL NEWS

Two FPNL grant applications funded! Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands is pleased to announce that we have received **funding for TWO grant applications** that FPNL submitted in late 2008 and 2009.

The first, a grant from the **Federal Recreational Trails Grant Program, will fund the installation of a Clivus Multrum composting toilet, the design and installation of a trailhead map, and improvements to the parking areas** at the D&R Canal State Park Headquarters/Mapleton Preserve. As many of you know, there are no toilets at the Preserve except a single toilet that is only available when the park office is open, is not handicapped-accessible, and is insufficient to handle visitation at the park. Installation of the Clivus Multrum will truly fill a "pressing" need for the site. *If you want to help with its installation, please contact Karen at 609-683-0483*.

The planned trailhead map will highlight the many trails and trail connections present at the **Preserve**, including two trails to the nearby D&R Canal, and two trails to the Cook Preserve and Rail Trail. FPNL has already prepared a trail map for the Mapleton Preserve and installed a map box, but we often find the box empty due to the growing popularity of the site. A permanent map will overcome this problem.

The second funded grant is for the design, fabrication and installation of interpretive signs for the Preserve. This project was funded by the New Jersey Historical Commission. FPNL has already started working with the Mapleton Preserve Commission and the D&R Canal State Park staff to develop these outdoor interpretive displays, which will help to interpret the rich history of Princeton Nurseries for park visitors.

We are very grateful to both agencies for funding our grant applications, and look forward to the start of both projects later this spring.

Restoration of the Propagation House: In the last newsletter, we reported that South Brunswick Township's Historic Preservation Commission had been granted \$290,000 from the New Jersey Historic Trust to begin plans for restoration work on the Propagation House, the historic heart of Princeton Nurseries. The architectural firm of Watson & Henry Associates has submitted a proposal (currently under review) for stabilization of the Propagation House and restoration of one of the greenhouses. Watson and Henry Associates also recently completed a Preservation Plan for the entire Propagation House Complex; South Brunswick Township obtained funding for the plan from Middlesex County.

<u>Martin Luther King Day Work Session</u>: Thank you so much! Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands (FPNL extends its heart-felt gratitude to all who helped at our Mapleton Preserve Cleanup on Martin Luther King Day, Jan 18, 2010. It was fabulous to see such an outpouring of energy and spirit!

Over 40 volunteers from all walks of life responded to our call to help with the cleanup, and they made an AWESOME contribution to the Preserve. It is amazing what a group of dedicated volunteers can get done in just 3 hours! Some cleared trees and brush around the propagation house and greenhouses--the historic complex that will be restored as an interpretive center. Wielding saws and loppers, we got the entire building circumference cleared. What a fabulous effort!

Others explored the 50(+) acres of Mapleton Preserve and picked up trash. This group collected at least

26 bags of nonrecyclables, 4 bags of recyclables, 6 tires, contractor trash and a neat deer skeleton. We particularly wish to thank Dave Wells (Robert Wells Tree & Landscape), Tari Pantaleo and John Keating (South Brunswick Post), who helped document our efforts with photographs, and Don Swaysland (who once

The D&R Canal State Park staff has now whisked away the collected trash, and has continued the clearing efforts by taking down the trees that had sprung up around one of the warehouses. EVENTS AT THE PRINCETON NURSERY LANDS THIS SPRING

FPNL Annual Arbor Day Celebration: Saturday April 17th, 10-11:30 and 1-4 pm. (rain date April 18th)

Our Arbor Day celebration welcomes all to the Mapleton Preserve, the former home of Princeton Nurseries. Join Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands and the D & R Canal State Park for a fun-filled day in celebration of Spring!

The day's events begin at 10 a.m. with a <u>history-oriented walk</u> led by the D&R Canal State Park's historian, <u>Vicki Chirco</u>. This 2-mile round trip between the Mapleton Preserve and the canal towpath will start at the D&R Canal State Park Headquarters at 145 Mapleton Road in Kingston. The history of the canal and the Princeton Nurseries will be highlighted. **Pre-registration for this walk is requested** (609-924-5705 or http://www.dandrcanal.com/programs.html).

At 1:00 p.m., <u>Jim Consolloy</u>, former Head Grounds Manager for Princeton University, will lead a <u>tree walk</u> that focuses on spring-flowering trees and the unique tree varieties that grow at the Mapleton Preserve. Jim was for many years responsible for maintaining Princeton University's 2300 acres and over 400 species of trees. He will share tips on tree identification and care.

Following the walk, <u>learn the proper way to plant a tree</u>, as the Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands (FPNL) and participants install the newest specimens in the <u>Flemer Arboretum</u>. This continues FPNL's tradition of planting trees donated by Princeton Nurseries, which once operated a wholesale tree nursery on the site. The Arboretum is named for the <u>Flemer family</u> which owned and operated Princeton Nurseries, in particular William Flemer Jr. and his sons, legendary plantsman William Flemer III and Dr. John Flemer. William Flemer III developed some of the best-loved plants in American horticulture, including the Princeton Sentry Gingko, 'Snow Queen' Hydrangea, and the October Glory Maple.

The tree planting will be followed at 3:00 pm by traditional seasonal different dance groups:

Princeton Country Dancers (http://www.princetoncountrydancers.org/), will demonstrate Maypole dancing. This is a form of folk dance from Western Europe that is traditionally performed in the spring (for May Day) or midsummer (in the Scandinavian countries). Dancers weave around a tall pole bedecked with streamers, causing the ribbons to intertwine in decorative patterns.

Handsome Molly (http://www.HandsomeMolly.com) will perform traditional "Mollie" dances. In the East Anglia region of England, it was customary on Plough Monday for field hands (who called themselves "Mollies") to dress in women's clothing, decorate a farmer's plow and drag it along from house to house or pub to pub, singing and dancing and demanding food, money and drink. If the owner didn't produce, the revelers would plow up the yard in retribution. Handsome Molly has adapted these dances to the American style.

Griggstown Lock Rapper Sword Team

(http://www.princetoncountrydancers.org/pcdgroups/griggstown/griggstown.html) performs "rapper dancing" from the coal mining villages of Northumbria. The dances are done to fast jig-time music played by a fiddler, and are performed by five dancers equipped with short, flexible two-handle swords called rappers. The team weaves intricate figures in which the dancers and swords become

tangled and untangled in traditional patterns with occasional arrangement into a "lock" in the shape of a star. The team is named after the Griggstown Lock on the Delaware and Raritan Canal.

Millstone River Morris will be performing "Morris" dances from the village of "*Princeton-Under-Construction*". They dance in groups of six or eight, wearing white shirts and trousers, braided baldrics in orange, green, and yellow, and bells on their legs. You can also catch them every dawn on May Day at the Mercer Oak, Princeton Battlefield!

Everyone will receive a baby flowering or evergreen tree to take home. The event, co-sponsored by the Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands and the D&R Canal State Park, will begin at the D&R Canal Park Office, 145 Mapleton Road in Kingston. It is free and open to all.
