From 1913 to 1995, Princeton Nurseries operated a thriving wholesale tree nursery on up to 1500 acres of land, and its departure left much of the beautiful landscape adjacent to the D & R Canal and historic Kingston vulnerable to development. Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands (FPNL) was established in 2000 to work for the preservation of the unique cultural landscape of the former Princeton Nurseries Kingston Site.

A major focus right now is raising the funds needed to begin restoration of the Propagation house, the historic heart of the Nursery. The need is particularly pressing at this time, since the original plans need to be reworked due to the discovery of asbestos in the greenhouse glazing.
