Program on Plainsboro Preserve. Also in May, FPNL and friends spent a virtual evening with Anne Price, Manager and Naturalist at the Plainsboro Preserve, a natural haven that is managed cooperatively by NJ Audubon, the Township of Plainsboro, and Middlesex County. Anne discussed the history of the Plainsboro Preserve and NJ Audubon's role there, its trail system, and some of the exciting flora and fauna to be found on the property.

FPNL Annual Meeting May, 2021 "WE'RE BACK!" EMERGENCE OF THE BROOD X PERIODICAL CICADAS: Professor George Hamilton, Chair, Department of Entomology and Director of the Rutgers Graduate Program in Entomology, spoke to us about the highly anticipated emergence of the 17-year cicadas in a fascinating illustrated slide talk. The preserve hosted a very large number of these insects during this amazing natural spectacle. Below are a pair of emerging adults (left), two adults (middle photo) and the empty exoskeletons from which the adults emerged, which could be found still clinging to leaves for most of the summer (right).










August: Scavenger Hunt. On a lovely day this summer, FPNL hosted a nature-oriented scavenger hunt. It was so nice to be able to spend time outdoors searching for bones, scat (animal poop), flowers and bugs. Extra points were given to any team that could catch (and kill) a spotted lanternfly. Unfortunately, there were many sightings of this invasive new insect.

September: For National Public Lands Day, the Flemer Arboretum got a nice facelift: Teams each adopted the trees developed by Princeton Nurseries in the Flemer Arboretum. All of the cultivars were weeded, and participants learned some tree identification techniques as well as proper ways to fertilize and mulch. The trees of the Flemer Arboretum in Mapleton Preserve received a large dose of tender loving care, and the arboretum looks better than it has in years!
